My resignation from the state committee does not mean that I am going away or that my passion and resolve are not in me to fight for liberty. I understand the insistence not to walk away, for in doing so they win. By "they "I mean corruptibles. I have seen the shenanigans since the caucus, leading to the state convention, and especially in Tampa and even still at our county officer elections last week.

I am sorry to those of you who have asked me to reconsider, for I'm afraid I cannot. I did not make the decision lightly. And I did not make the decision because my guy didn't win chair.

As some of you know it has been something I have been considering for a while now. I do not prefer to be where I am clearly unwanted. I have been trying for 7 months to get a list of County Committee members for the purpose of organization. I finally got them days before county officer elections.

The committee doesn't follow its bylaws (a copy of which I had a hard time getting), and people have been voting that aren't members and haven't been for 7 months. I have given my contact info to the representative for county chapter of the Federation of Republican women three times since June, never to be contacted. The list goes on and on.

At last week's County Committee officers election, Roger Ek, whom I greatly respect, ran for Vice Chair, and while he was giving his speech, I watched a table of well-connected GOP members (who had not been to a meeting in the last year or so) roll their eyes at each other and shake their heads at his words in disgust.

I now completely understand why the party was in minority for 40 years.

They had a prime opportunity to grow the Party in 2010 with the Tea Party movement and again this past year with the youth and Ron Paul supporters.

They would rather be the king of nothing than to embrace the conservative side of the party.

Debra Plowman's message as chair=we will elect republicans to every possible position.

What I have witnessed is the recruitment of Democrats and the goal to get someone to hold the slot until they can get an (R) behind name, switch to candidate and boom: a Republican appears in office.

Unfortunately, that is not how the "powers that be" see it. I pray they see it before it is too late for the good of the country.

I look forward with anticipation to the future of the liberty movement: limited government, fiscal responsibility, personal freedom.
